### Charter

The Board of Regents is empowered via the Charter, to grant degrees to qualified applicants upon the completion of the Board approved curriculum in compliance with HLC, NCA. The Board of Regents formulates and implements administrative policies and procedures for the operation of the institution.

### **Accreditation**

CCCC is accredited through The Higher Learning Commission (HLC), North Central Association of Colleges and Schools (NCA) and is a member of the American Indian Higher Education Consortium (AIHEC) and the North Dakota Association of Tribal Colleges (NDATC).

I am also an uncle to two nephews and one niece. I attended Devils Lake Public Schools from the first grade to high school graduation on May 29, 2011. Currently, I am a student at Cankdeska Cikana Community College (CCCC), working on my Associates of Science in Pre-Engineering. I will graduate from CCCC in the spring of 2013. I plan to attend North Dakota State University (NDSU), where I will be working on my Bachelors of Science in Civil Engineering.

I am very active in extra curriculum activities. I am the president of the American Indian Science and Engineering Society (AISES) chapter at CCCC. Until I graduate in the spring, I hold the position of vice president of Student Government at CCCC. I am also a participant of American Indian Higher of Education Consortium (AIHEC). Last year, I competed in the Science bowl in Rapid City, SD. This year I will compete in Green Bay, W.I.

Since I was a freshman in high school, I have attended the North Dakota Experimental Programs to Stimulate Competitive Research (EPSCoR) program, along with the Nurturing American Tribal Undergraduate Research and Education (NATURE) programs during the summer months. The Science, Technology, Math and Science (STEM) program is what really got me into the field of engineering. I always liked math and science because they came easier to me than other subjects; they engaged my interests more.

United Tribes Technical College, of Bismarck, ND is serving as the lead institution, overseeing DeMaND Workforce programs at Aaniiih Nakoda College (Harlem, MT), Cankdeska Cikana Community College (Fort Totten, ND) and Fort Peck Community College.

The Wiconi Ohitika (Strong Life) Suicide Prevention Project participates in local and National conferences. The project staff consists of a Director, Coordinator, two Youth Prevention Specialists (YPS) (1 vacant), Administrative Assistant/Data Technician, Case Manager, Evaluator and consultants. The YPS workers go into 3 local schools (Four Winds, Minnewaukan and Warwick) Monday through Thursday. To date, the YPS workers have made contact with 4,608 students, via implementation of American Indian Life Skills (AILS) curriculum and Suicide Prevention activities. The program utilizes Spirit Lake Dakota Elders as special speakers at events and activities.

Wiconi Ohitika held and sponsored community events, such as beading classes, regalia making classes, trainings, conferences and pow wows. Regular monthly activities include Dakota Youth Activities, which are held in each of the four districts on Spirit Lake, Community Rosary, Day of Prayer, Elder Advisory meetings and Open Mic Night. Wiconi Ohitika also hosts monthly Spirit Lake Suicide Prevention Coalition Meetings averaging 13-15 participants from BIA Law Enforcement, Spirit Lake Tribal Court, SL Tribal Social Services, Lake Region Human Services, SL Youth Healing and Wellness, and community members.






# Adult Learning Center (GED Program)

Cankdeska Cikana Community College's Adult Education Program is funded by the State of North Dakota and CCCC. The program served two hundred and fifty seven people in 2012. Students must attend class at least twelve hours a week to qualify for the state program. This year fifty nine students qualified for the state program. We currently have fifteen graduates this year. Six of these graduates are attending CCCC.

### **Land Grant**







Cankdeska Cikana Community College was granted land-grant status under an Act of Congress in 1994. The USDA National Institute for Food and Agriculture supports the 1994 Land Grant mission to serve native communities through higher education programs involving education, extension, and research. The Tribal Colleges Endowment Fund supports the delivery of culturally relevant environmental education to students and extended community via service learning opportunities in community gardening, campus landscaping and sustainability.

Enhancing Community Assets through Agriculture is the newest project to the CCCC Land Grant Program. It supports the development of a sustainable food production on campus and enhances access to fresh foods, and encourages the development of a community farmers market. Twelve farmers markets were held during the past year and vendors from the community participated.

Enriching Spirit Lake Agricultural and Natural Resources is an academic curriculum funded by the USDA Tribal College Equity Program that offers a



culturally appropriate place-based curriculum that integrates Dakota culture into experiential learning activities that generate community interest and involvement. Eight CCCC students receive stipends to help support their academic endeavors in an Associate of Natural Resource Management degree program that includes active student engagement in community-based projects.

The Food & Nutrition Education project utilizes funds from the USDA Tribal College Extension Program to provide food & nutrition education through workshops in healthy eating, food preservation, and food preparation for the Spirit Lake community. Workshops were held each month and 177 CCCC staff, students and community members attended.

The Enhancing Outreach Activities for Community Engagement and Producer Success project through AIHEC helps address the increasing demands on the current community tilling project so the program can focus on education based assistance to promote producer success. The project helped till 55 gardens for community members and also loaned eight tillers to individuals and provided seeds and plants.



## NACTEP - Native American Career & Technical Education Program

Cankdeska Cikana Community College's Native American Career and Technical Education Program (NACTEP) is a five year grant funded by the US Department of Education implemented in October 2007. NACTEP was awarded a sixth year grant for fiscal year 2013. Continuation awards are contingent upon successful completion of the grant objectives as outlines in the annual progress reports.

The purpose of the program is to provide training in the areas of Carpentry, Finish Carpentry, and Medical Assistant. The Carpentry program currently has eight students; the Finish Carpentry program has four students registered; and the Medical Assistant program has six students participating. Each of these programs is a one year certificate program approved by the ND Department of Career and Technical Education. A Commercial Drivers License (CDL) training program was added. Currently there are six students in the CDL program. There will be two CDL trainings, one in the fall of 2012 and another in the spring of 2013. There will also be Heavy Equipment Operator Training programs in the spring and summer of 2013. Each of these programs are a six week training.

Each eligible NACTEP student, depending on funding available, receives assistance in the form of stipends, tutoring, transportation, clothing, placement, advising, etc.

NACTEP students who are enrolled in the Medical Assistant program are allowed to check out a laptop computer for use with their on-line classes.











### Title III



The Title III program is funded by the US Department of Education and activities of the program include the development and implementation of online courses and courses utilizing online components, a student outreach effort targeting high school students, out of school, and tribal employees, and the increase of the number of faculty and staff that have advanced degrees, certifications and trainings.

21 staff members used Title III professional development funds to complete course work towards advanced degrees and certification. 23 staff members attended workshops/conference.

Funds were available to build a new 1,100 sq. ft. college bookstore adjacent to the Student Union and to increase the holdings of the college library by adding 361 volumes, ebooks, and periodicals.

Title III takes care of ongoing equipment, computer software and CCCC website upgrades, setting up email accounts for students and offers onsite technology training and demonstrations to the public.

Cankdeska Cikana Community College is one of only four Certiport Authorized Testing Centers in North Dakota and during the past year 45 CCCC students earned certifications in the following:

## TRiO Student Support Services (SSS)

The TRIO Student Support Services (SSS) Program is an academic support program funded by a grant from the U.S. Department of Education. The SSS program served 105 full-time and part-time students during the academic year. The program consists of three goals which will guide the operation of the program and provide quantitative measures to assess the progress and quality of the program. The program consists of the Director, the Administrative Assistant, one Advisor, and two Advisors/Instructors.

The program goals are to:

- Increase the persistence rate of eligible students
- Increase the good academic standing of program participants
- Increase the graduation/transfer rate of program participants

Some of the services that the SSS Program offered during the academic year are as follows:

- Academic, Financial, Career and/or Personal Advising on a daily basis
- Professional Tutorial Services offered by all staff members averaging 1-2 students weekly
- Peer Tutorial Services by Darcy Smith and Allura LaRoque averaging 4 students daily
- Informative Workshops offered weekly with an average of 12 students attending each workshop
- Transitioning to a Four Year Institution assistance to all students
- Academic/Cultural Events AIHEC Conference, Theatre Plays, North Dakota Heritage Center in Bismarck, ND, Medora Academic/Cultural Events with an average of 6 students attending each event
- Grant Aid Assistance: 39 students received \$600 during the Fall Semester and 4 students received \$600 with 14 students receiving \$529 during the Spring Semester for a total of \$33,206.00 given out for the academic year
- College Campus Tours to the University of North Dakota and Valley City State University with 6 students attending each tour
- Computer Lab Assistance averaging 5 students each day
- Disability Services to 2 students during the academic year









### TRiO Educational Talent Search



The Talent Search Program, funded by the U.S. Department of Education, assists in enabling youth that have academic potential but may lack adequate information or school preparation to enter, continue, or resume programs of secondary and post-secondary education, including GED certification.

The program is funded for 600 participants where at least two-thirds are required to come from low income and potential first generation college students. Students are recruited and served within five target schools. Talent Search staffs one Director and three Educational Advisors who engage with the students in their schools four days a week.

For the 2011/2012 school year, 427 of the 600 students were from low income and potential first generation college student homes. Additionally, 396 of the 600 students were Native American with a majority of them being enrolled in the Spirit Lake Nation.

The purpose of the program is to monitor and ensure students' success through regular contacts with an Advisor. Services include academic advisement, financial aid information, college information/admissions, ACT preparation, career exploration/advisement, and workshops to enhance student aptitude such as tutoring, study and test taking skills. The program also co-sponsors an intensive summer program that offers a general overview of career options available, concentrating on various fields and opportunities as well as cultural teaching and enhancement.



## **Student Off Campus Activities**

CCCC students have the opportunity to participate in activities such as the American Indian Higher Education Consortium (AIHEC) annual conference as well as to serve as officers of the Student Congress. Students are able to compete with students from other tribal colleges in areas of math, science, office simulations, computers, speech, athletics, cultural activities, and art.

There are other activities that students can also participate. Students from the TRiO Student Services went to Bismarck for the Heritage Center and Norsk HostFest in Minot. The art students visited the Heritage Center and the Mandan Indian Village.



## Valerie Merrick Memorial Library



Valerie Merrick Memorial Library serves as the academic/public /tribal library for Spirit Lake Nation and the surrounding area.

The 12 station computer lab with public internet access maintains an average computer usage, by students and community members, of 515 per month. Through a continued partnership with the National Library of Medicine/National Institute of Health, new books and materials are purchased to build the health information section. These grants also provide funding for student interns, who are able to explore librarianship as a career, in addition to providing extended library hours.

Library programming includes a yearly summer reading camp for children, ages 5-12. The theme this year was, "Dream Big ~ READ!" We had 47 children participate and 17 participants who completed the three week program.

Current library holdings include 17,965 books and 65 magazines, 11 newspapers, 199 DVDs.

## ACF "Next Steps" (Administration for Children and Families)

The Next Steps Program is funded by the US Department of Health and Human Services and is a jobs related training program directed at the health profession. The program assists individuals who are enrolled in a federally recognized tribe, who are on TANF or they are of low income (200% of the poverty level), with assistance toward childcare, tuition, books, transportation (limited), clinical and nursing requirements, etc.

Our program is working with the Tribes located at Standing Rock Indian Reservation, Fort Berthold Indian Reservation, Spirit Lake Indian Reservation and the Indian community located in the Bismarck/Mandan metropolitan area.

At year end (9/29/12) Next Steps was working with 71 participants in various parts of the state:

- 22 participants working on their LPN Degrees; 1 at CCCC; 12 at UTTC; 7 at SBC; 1 at WSC; 1 at DSU.
- 11 participants working on their RN Degrees; 3 at U of M; 5 at FBCC; 2 at DSU; 1 at Sanford.
- 11 participants working on their BSN Degrees;
   2 at FBCC/UND; 1 at MSU; 8 at UND.
- 5 participants working on their Social Work Degree; l at MSU; 2 at SBC/UND; 1 at UND; 1 at U of M.
- 2 participants working on their Nutrition Degree at UTTC.
- 7 participants who had applied and were waiting to be accepted into the UND RN/BSN program.

In addition we had 13 participants who were working on their employment plans and pathways for goal setting. We will assist these individuals with finding gainful employment in our third year of funding which began on 9/30/12.

# Wakanhezi Oti (Sacred Children's Place)







Wakanheza Oti, CCCCs early childhood learning center opened in 2010 and was constructed in collaboration with the Spirit Lake Dakota Nation, Spirit Lake Casino & Resort and the Spirit Lake Tribe Employment & Training Program, with a Title III construction grant under the Tribal Colleges and Universities Program (TCUP). The center is licensed to serve 72 children.

Sacred Children's Place provides CCCC's Early Childhood degree seeking students an opportunity to participate in experiential learning activities. Students are able to provide care to children while earning credits toward their degree using labs and observation rooms. Integrating the Early Childhood program of study with opportunities to work with children in Sacred Children's Place results in students not only having a theory based foundation for Early Childhood Education, but also provides them hands on, instructor guided, experiences working with children.






## **Employee Profile**

### CCCC Students Named to the 2012 All-North Dakota Academic Team







BISMARCK, N.D. - Twelve North Dakota community college students have been named to the 2012 All-North Dakota Academic Team, which recognizes the academic achievements of community college students. Two students from Cankdeska Cikana Community College (CCCC, Ft. Totten, ND) were members of that team, Tina Ross and Craig Brown, Jr.

"These students are outstanding examples of academic achievement and community involvement," said Bill Goetz, chancellor of the North Dakota University System. "Being named to the All-North Dakota Academic Team is a significant accomplishment, one that both the students and their colleges can be proud of. Clearly, students who attend North Dakota's community colleges are well prepared to meet the evolving demands of the workforce or continue on for additional education."

In North Dakota, the community college awards are co-sponsored by Phi Theta Kappa International Honor Society and CTEC, the North Dakota University System College Technical Education Council. The academic team recognition program is active in 37 states. Students named to the state team also are nominated for the All-USA Academic Team.

Nominations are based on outstanding academic performance and service to the college and community. Each member of the North Dakota team will receive a certificate of congratulations from Gov. Dalrymple, an award certificate, a medallion and a monetary award. Each team member also is eligible for scholarships from Valley City State University, University of North Dakota, North Dakota State University, Mayville State University, Minot State University, University of Mary and Jamestown College.





### Student Profile

CCCC has approximately 250 students with an average age of 27 years. The majority of CCCC students are Native American but generally have 3 percent non-Indians enroll each semester. Most students are parents who work full time. Students face many issues – 85 percent live at or below the poverty level and 95 percent are eligible for financial aid.

## **Institutional Partnerships**

#### **Articulation Agreements**

CCCC maintains articulation/transfer agreements with several North Dakota University System (NDUS) colleges and universities. These agreements were created to ensure transfer of credits from Tribal College and Universities to the NDUS. CCCC also participates in the common course numbering system that courses offered will transfer to another campus.

#### **Dual Credit**

CCCC has partnered with area schools to offer dual credit courses to eligible high school juniors and seniors on or near the reservation. The program provides high school students with the opportunity to complete essential study requirements while still in high school. The students obtain both high school and college credit through this collaboration. Recent policy changes in 2012 by the North Dakota Department of Public Instruction mandate minimum ACT scores of 18 for English and 21 for Math for students wishing to participate in dual credit courses.

#### Online courses

Online courses are offered to students to enhance their ability to take courses at their leisure as long as they have computer access. This provides local and distance students with the opportunity to take a variety of courses without having to travel.

### North Dakota Interactive Video Network (IVN)

A variety of courses are offered on the CCCC campus to and from partner North Dakota tribal college and universities and/or the North Dakota University System institutions. This mode of instruction uses a separate classroom to transmit live audio and video from campus to campus in near real time. Students are able to have direct instruction from faculty that are hundreds of miles away. The University of North Dakota BRIN and

INBRE and Mayville State University have provided IVN equipment to assist in this important effort to increase students interested in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) careers. The North Dakota IVN is dedicated to enhancing educational opportunities in North Dakota through distance education. College credit courses have first priority for scheduling; however, other organizations and individuals are encouraged to use the system for meetings, conferences, and workshops as the schedule permits.

The American Indian College Fund provides this prestigious award to recognize outstanding faculty members at Tribal Colleges and Universities. Ms. Rohrich currently holds a Master of Arts degree in English and is working on a Masters in Creative Writing.



### PEEC Program at CCCC a good start to a great future

The Pre-Engineering Education Collaborative (PEEC) the National Science Foundation, Cankdeska Cikana Community College (CCCC), Sitting Bull College (SBC), Turtle Mountain Community College (TMCC), Fort Berthold Community College (FBCC), and North Dakota State University (NDSU) began in September, 2010. The program, through CCCC leadership, prepares tribal college students for the matriculation to a mainstream university such as NDSU.

A tribal college student is given the opportunity to complete their Associates Degree at CCCC, and then transfer as a junior to NDSU to complete their bachelor's degree in the engineering major of their choice. Students will have met a number of the professors at NDSU before they ever transfer and many of these mentors will continue supporting these students throughout their education.

Two students well on their way to success in the PEEC program are Ryan Brown and Craig (CJ) Brown. These young men started in the North Dakota Experimental Program to Stimulate Competitive Research (ND EPSCOR) program while attending high school. The purpose of the EPSCOR is to provide students interested in Science, Technology, Engineering, & Mathematics (STEM) with an opportunity to develop broad and superior STEM education programs, allowing Tribal Colleges to outreach to students at the pre-college (grades 8th - 12th) level.

College President Cynthia Lindquist stated, "These two are pioneering engineering on the Spirit Lake Nation and exemplify the types of students we strive for at CCCC."

Ryan and CJ are scheduled to graduate from CCCC in the 2013 spring with their Associates in Pre-Engineering and will be transferring to NDSU complete a bachelor's degree in engineering.

When asked about his experience, CJ indicated "The PEEC program allowed us to take classes like Thermodynamics and Surveying at NDSU during the summer months so we know the curriculum, the layout of the campus, and how living in the dorms will be."

"The transitioning will be tough, but we have been provided the tools necessary to succeed plus we know most of our teachers at NDSU because of those summer classes." added Ryan.

Ryan and CJ agreed that CCCC provided them with a great opportunity to complete general education courses as well as advanced engineering courses. "Transferring to NDSU as a junior in the engineering program is an opportunity we contribute to CCCC."

### EPScOR/PEEC/INBRE

### **Nurturing American Tribal Undergraduate Research and Education** (NATURE)

NATURE is a culturally relevant educational outreach program sponsored by the North Dakota Experimental Programs to Stimulate Competitive Research (ND EPSCoR). NATURE is designed to build new and strengthen existing pathways for Native American students to pursue careers in science, focuses on American Indian heritage and how science and technology have evolved from such practices technology, engineering, and mathematics (STEM). Participants of the program include students and faculty from all five tribal colleges in North Dakota, high school students and teachers from the four North Dakota Indian reservations and faculty from research universities of North Dakota State University (NDSU) and University of North Dakota (UND). In its eighth year at CCCC, Nature has served nearly 2000 High School and Tribal College students to acquire a taste for science, technology, engineering, & mathematics (STEM). Through Sunday Academies, Summer STEM Camps, and Undergraduate Research Experiences, NATURE exposes some 80 Spirit Lake students to STEM activities designed and implemented by tribal faculty and teachers. The program encourages respect for American Indian practices within the context of scientific methods and theories. This focus offers an even greater relevancy to students and faculty who participate.

### National Science Foundation - Pre-Engineering **Education Collaborative (NSF PEEC)**

NSF PEEC provides support for pilot efforts to establish or enhance engineering pipelines in TCUP institutions, alone or in collaboration with other TCUP institutions and colleges of engineering. The National Science Foundation supports this new initiative intended to dramatically increase the number of American Indian and Native students pursuing engineering degrees. This unique program is allowing students to utilize Interactive Video Network technology to deliver engineering courses that normally were only offered on Research 1 campuses. ND PEEC is one of four nationwide projects that has matriculated three students to partner institution North Dakota State University and has four additional students intended to transfer in Fall 2013 as juniors in engineering. Overall, this project serves a group of 15 to 20 students that are at different levels in their educational endeavor.

### North Dakota Idea Network for Biomedical Research Excellence (ND INBRE)

The goal of North Dakota INBRE is to build biomedical research capacity by serving research universities, baccalaureate institutions, and tribal colleges within the state. The scientific network will also offer research opportunities to students from neighboring tribal colleges. An Outreach Core is designed to empower tribal colleges to strengthen their introductory science curricula so as to increase the level of preparation. In its fourth year at CCCC, ND INBRE has helped develop a cadre of student research assistants of nearly 50 students and staff. Through the INBRE project, the First Annual North Dakota Tribal College Symposium will be hosted at CCCC in February 2013.
