CCCC is chartered by the Spirit Lake Tribe, with a five member Board of Regents appointed by the Tribal Council to serve three-year terms. The Board of Regents is empowered, to grant degrees to qualified applicants upon the completion of the approved curriculum. The Board of Regents formulates and implements policies and procedures for the operation of the institution. Three of the five members are CCCC graduates; all have bachelors degree. Mr. Lohnes has a masters.

LETTER FROM PRESIDENT

Providing an annual report to the Spirit Lake community and to the various funding sources is part of our effort for transparency and accountability. Cankdeska Cikana Community College (CCCC) is the Spirit Lake Tribe's post-secondary institution and it belongs to the people – our young people specifically – and all community members who want to go to college.

Per the annual financial audit that is summarized in the annual report, CCCC has a strong financial foundation and the institution continues to have audits with no findings. The College has worked hard to improve student enrollment as well as persistence, retention, and completion numbers. The institutional profile documents these data points that are kept on a semester to semester basis. CCCC has used the COVID relief funds according to guidelines and has published three separate reports on those expenditures.

Based on the CCCC Strategic Plan and the budgeting process, the College is effective in meeting its mission of "student independence and self-sufficiency" by always being student-focused. The ongoing accreditation review of student assessment and program reviews documents the integrity for the teaching and learning process that is provided to the students. CCCC graduates truly can "start here, go anywhere."

The annual report provides summary data, financial information and stories about the employees and students who are served by the College. More detailed reports and information may be found on the CCCC web site – www.littlehoop.edu – and we encourage you to take the time to browse and read the materials.

Our primary goals for the future are to maintain record student enrollment, help CCCC students transfer to bachelor's programs, establish a bachelor's program for Dakota Studies, and to build an education/cultural arts center that includes a Spirit Lake museum or heritage center.



The CCCC Head Start program is currently funded for 158 children. CCCC Head Start program serves 72 children, ages 3-5 years, and CCCC Early Head Start serves 56 center-based children, ages 0-3 years, and 30 home-based children with 97% Native American.


CCCC Head Start helps children from low-income families prepare for Kindergarten readiness. Family Service Advisors (FSA) implement Family Partnership goals with families to encourage them to fulfill their goals. The FSAs assess the needs of the family, help resolve issues and promote wellbeing, human rights and social justice.



End of Year Ceremony

End of Year ceremonies for children transitioning to Kindergarten were conducted for 20 children. Due to COVID restrictions, only two adults for each child were invited to attend, and all participants were asked to wear masks. Children presented two songs. They sang the "ABC Song" while signing the letters. Another song was the "Graduation Song" by Miss Linky. Each child was presented a certificate and a blanket.

EVELYN GREENE LEARNING CENTER



After three years of pandemic with no in-person events, CCCC was able to host a ceremony to celebrate 25 students completing their GED certification during that time period! In June 2022, 9 of the 25 students participated at the event as noted in the photo below.

The highlight of the ceremony was the renaming of the CCCC Adult Learning Center to the Evelyn Greene Learning Center! Mrs. Greene dedicate her life to education and served as the Director of the program until she retired in 2008. Evelyn was engaged and committed to helping community members to complete the GED. She created a positive learning environment for all the students and went out of her way in support of their success. Mrs. Greene's daughters, Kristi and Brenda, participated at the unveiling of the plaque and her grandson, Christopher, provided wonderful comments.

The CCCC Evelyn Greene Learning Center provides access and support to individuals seeking to complete the GED program by providing computers, training, pretesting, and testing. Using COVID relief funds, CCCC provided the GED students with gift cards for groceries or gas. All GED completers are offered tuition waivers to attend CCCC to continue their learning journey. Of the 25 GED completers, ten became college students at CCCC.








replace a portion of traditional face-toface instruction with web-based online learning Currently 85% of the courses offered at CCCC are hybrid – synchronous Zoom meetings at a specific date/time. Offering hybrid courses addresses barriers students noted on their assessments for not succeeding, such as transportation, childcare, work conflicts, or family issues. Since offering hybrid courses, enrollment, persistence, retention, and grades have all improved. Some online courses are offered as well as in-person classes for CDL, Carpentry, and Fine Arts.

Various trainings were provided for faculty on evidencebased practices to create and design effective online and hybrid courses and environments; how to improve student engagement; and how to provide deeper levels of learning. Some of the practices being used include:

- Online virtual laboratory for science and natural resource courses
- Extended tutoring hours provided by a math coach and a professional tutor
- Flexibility in schedules offering more evening classes per student requests
- "Chunking" instructional materials (providing information in smaller increments (chunks) for better understanding)
- Interactive, meaningful lessons
- High student engagement by providing discussions, projects, and breakout rooms
- Attendance tracking using software programs

Laptops, printers/scanners, and other technological resources are provided for faculty to provide online options. All students are provided with laptops.

Business program meeting needs

The Business Administration Program is meeting the needs of students as well as providing the local community with graduates who are ready to go to work to make a difference. Business students are immersed in the liberal arts while becoming proficient in core business practices to be program directors.

The business program moved to the popular hybrid model of instruction in the Spring of 2020. The program saw a 42.8% increase in fall term enrollment (Fall 2021). In addition to increase enrollment, the program also experienced a 15% increase in fall to fall retention (2020-2021).

Social work students making a difference

CCCCs 2+2 program with UND Social Work has had 15 students graduate with bachelor's degrees in social work. Thirteen of the 15 are either working for the Spirit Lake Tribe or in Devils Lake, ND. Two moved out-of-state for great jobs as Native social workers.

The federal COVID relief funding CCCC received allowed the College to transition to an online platform and to address barriers faced by tribal college students – such as child care, transportation, paying bills, etc. Students have greater flexibility in using the online platform that better accommodates their family and work schedules. Enrollment, persistence, retention and completion rates for CCCC social work are greatly improved.

Currently there are 29 social work students at CCCC plus four enrolled at UND via the 2+2 program. Six CCCC social work graduates have been accepted into UNDs Social Work program; they will begin in the summer or fall of 2023. The key to the success of the program is a student-focused partnership.

Liberal Arts students

The Liberal Arts Committee has discussed different ways to help liberal arts students receive more exposure to various fields of study and academic disciplines. Some of the options under consideration are guest speakers, internships, and field trips. Also discussed this semester, was the option of having an evening meeting with liberal arts students, with a meal provided, to foster communication between instructors and students. Finally, the committee began exploring various training options that might be available for the professional development of liberal arts faculty.

Pre-Engineering added relationships

The ND PEEC program saw the retirement of its patriarch, Dr. Bob Pieri, Professor of Mechanical Engineering from NDSU. Dr. Bob has been leading the cohort since its inception over 10 years ago and has been instrumental in its formation as well as the articulated relationship between NDSU and the ND TCUs involved. We were also happy to see the fifth North Dakota TCU, United Tribes Technical College, join the cohort along with its mentor Alexa Azure. The consortium plans on submitting another NSF proposal in the new year to receive further funding into the next 5 years.

Students are filling a critical need

Early Childhood Education is growing and excelling. Students from the ECE program are filling a critical community need for educating young children ages birth through eight years old by providing a comprehensive, holistic educational experience that seeks to lay a solid foundation for children's future learning and welfare.

CCCC has a Partnership Grant with Head Start that allows students to work at Head Start while obtaining an Early Childhood Education Bachelors of Art degree. If students maintain satisfactory academic progress, the student's tuition, books, and fees are waived. Students also receive financial incentives that support various achievements throughout the project.

Currently, there are 51 students that participate in the ECE program. The number of ECE graduates has continued to increase over the past four years. Persistence rates have risen over the past four years to 69%.

CCCC's new EF-truck driving simulator

CCCC's CDL program is a registered Entry-Level Driver Training Provider. Since October 2021, there have been a total of eight students, including one female, participating in the CDL training. Six students completed the program. The North Dakota Highway Patrol visits the students on a semester basis to provide an overview of what happens when they're inspected by the highway patrol. CCCC's new EF-truck driving simulator has been designed and engineered to meet the training needs of trucking fleets and truck driver training schools. This simulator offers a realistic truck cab, a comprehensive driver training program, and lifelike visuals. In addition, it offers a full motion platform with 2 degrees of freedom (DOF), which pitches and rolls the entire cab to simulate the movement of the truck driving down the road. All of this combines to produce an immersive training environment for professional drivers.

The program focuses on carpentry involving basic carpentry processes and safety on the work site. Students have the opportunity to participate in service and experiential learning activities both on and off campus related to construction trades. Since October 2021, NACTEP had a total of 26 students, including three female students in the Carpentry Program, four students have successfully completed the program.

Projects students participated in: Sheds, wishing wells, and dog houses. A major project for the Carpentry program is the building of a new house – building a home from the beginning with the floor on up. Another major project was taken on by the carpentry department, that is to renovate the Natural Resource Management kitchen; the cabinets are being made by the CNC Machine and Edge Bander that are from the Advanced Manufacturing program.



CCCC offers 10 CTE Programs

Career Technical Education (CTE) provides students of all ages with the academic and technical skills, knowledge and training necessary to succeed in future careers and to become lifelong learners. CTE prepares these learners for the world of work by introducing them to workplace competencies, and makes academic content accessible to students by providing it in a hands-on context. Foundational to CTE are rigorous and high-quality standards. The standards have been informed by state and industry standards and developed by a diverse group of teachers, business and industry experts, administrators, and researchers.






Enrollment Trends
